Outreach and Education

This March, WWCCD partnered with Dixie Elementary, the U.S. Corps of Engineers, and the Blue Mountain Chapter of Pheasants Forever for an outdoor educational experience. The students revisited their previous restoration site from last fall, where they planted 250 native plants. During this trip, students planted 150 plants along a riparian corridor within the Bennington Lake Recreation area. This program has been an ongoing educational experience for Dixie Elementary K-5th grade students, made possible with the funds from the Verle Kaiser Grant provided by WSU Extension.

Matthew Williams of Predictive Nutrient Solutions led an engaging discussion on soil health and current agriculture practices with local farmers. The Washington State Department of Agriculture was represented by Briana Rhode and Emily Oberhoffer, who discussed changes in pesticide requirements and water quality monitoring efforts. Daniel Matsche and Paul Rossow from the Department of Ecology discussed pest management in relation to agricultural burning.

Additionally, we would like to thank community members who participated in our farmer mini-sessions in February. There have been many agency changes, so adaptation is the game. Aside from program updates, farmers discussed the use of drones, grass weed management, and drought mitigation.
